WELCOME TO NORWICH UNIVERSITY

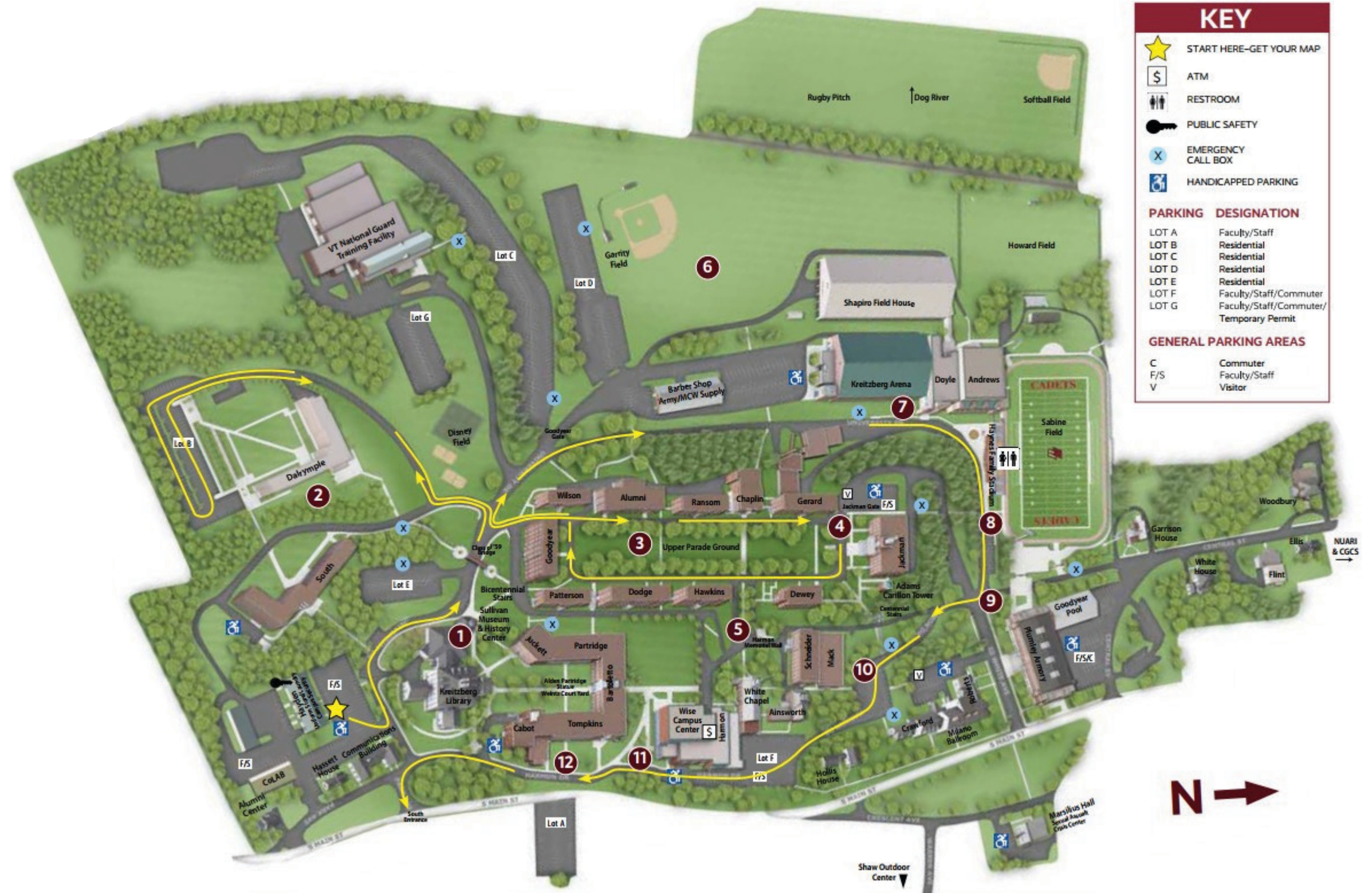
Thank you for taking the time to visit our campus today! We're excited to share Norwich with you through this self-guided tour.

Kreitzberg Library and Sullivan Museum & History Center

The Kreitzberg Library is a quiet spot for students to focus on academics, work on group projects, and tackle in-depth research. It's also home to the Sullivan Museum & History Center, the only Smithsonian affiliate in northern New England.

Our library recently underwent a \$6.1 million renovation that included new technology upgrades, increased data speeds, 3D printing stations, digital media commons, as well as fresh workstations, classrooms, and group study areas.

Located inside the library is also our Center for Academic Success and Achievement (CASA). CASA works with students who want to improve their study, time management, organizational, and learning skills and offers comprehensive individualized group tutoring. All services are included in tuition.



The Sullivan Museum & History Center features rotating exhibits and historical artifacts that are often used in academic coursework or undergraduate research projects.





South Hall and Dalrymple Hall



Norwich University offers students two lifestyle paths: military or civilian. Our civilian students live a traditional college lifestyle without the addition of military training in the Corps of Cadets.

While students in both lifestyles attend classes together, play on the same sports teams, and interact throughout campus, they live in separate residence halls.

South Hall and Dalrymple are our two civilian dormitories. Dorm rooms include a bed, desk with a chair, and a wall locker for each student. Dalrymple Hall is a 84,204-square-foot, energy-efficient and accommodates 286 students.



Dalrymple Hall and South Hall feature convenient study lounges for collaborative working. In-house gyms that make it easy for student-athletes and other active individuals to remain in top condition throughout the seasons.

Upper Parade Ground (UP)

Norwich University is known for its challenging military lifestyle, the Corps of Cadets. Students participate in ROTC coursework in addition to a 24/7 military training experience. While civilian students reside in the dormitories, the Corps of Cadets can find their barracks located on the Upper Parade Ground (UP).

Chaplin Hall and Dewey Hall are academic buildings that are also located on the UP. Jackman Hall (right), a key administrative building can be found on the north end as well. This building is home to the Bursar's Office (billing), Financial Aid Office, Registrar's Office, Army ROTC, Air Force ROTC, and the Commandant's Office.



Chaplin Hall is the academic building for our School of Architecture + Art. Our program offers students a five-year accelerated Masters Degree in Architecture.



Dewey Hall has recently undergone renovations and upgrades. It is home to our business and management majors as well as our psychology labs.



Wise Campus Center

The Wise Campus Center is a central hub of student activity on campus. It is home to our dining “chow” hall, mail room, campus bookstore, student lounges, and The Mill — a grab-and-go option for sandwiches and other snacks.

Across from the bookstore is Dunkin’ Donuts, a popular stop for students to grab a drink or snack on their way to class.

On the second floor you’ll also find our Career & Internship Center, Center for Civic Engagement, and Campus Activities Board. It’s a great network of support for students interested in being active participants on campus.

Athletic Facilities

Norwich University offers 22 varsity athletic sports at the Division III level. We offer our active students a variety of facilities to support them in their training goals.

This includes Shapiro Field House, Kreitzberg Arena, Andrews Hall, and Plumley Armory. All of which include gyms, workout equipment, and support the variety of sports teams here on campus.

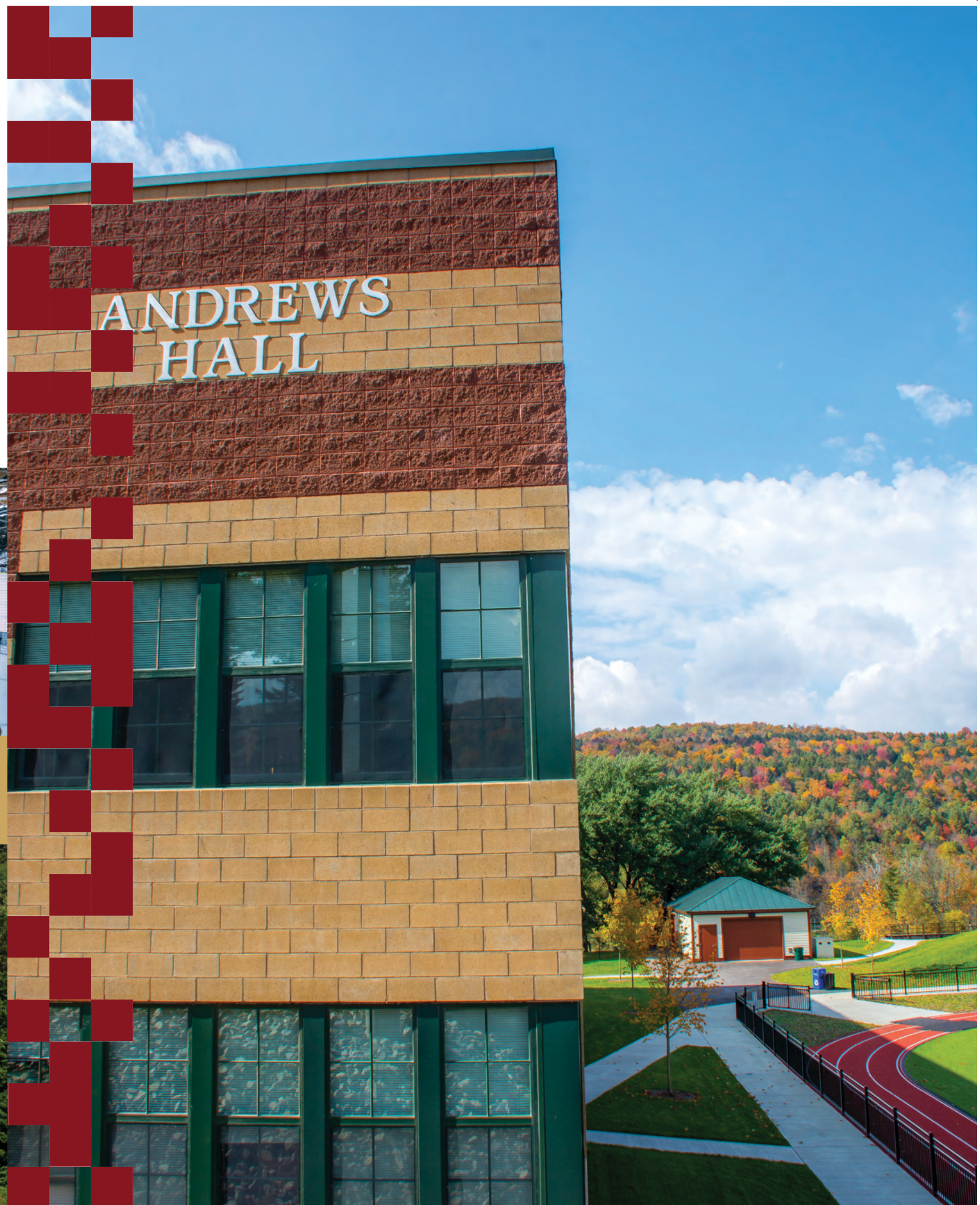
Next to Kreitzberg Arena and connected by Doyle Hall, is Andrews Hall (right). It has a shared volleyball and basketball court, as well as locker rooms, athletic training facilities, and an equipment room for the varsity teams, plus coaches' offices.



Norwich offers multiple grass playing fields for baseball, softball, soccer, lacrosse, football, and rugby. Sabine Field (below) is a multi-sport, multi-activity, lighted stadium with a synthetic turf.



Kreitzberg Arena is home to the National Champion Men's and Women's Ice Hockey teams and can seat 1,420 spectators. The 59,000-square-foot arena features a 200-foot by 90-foot ice surface.

Shapiro Field House spans 50,000 square feet and features a 200-meter indoor running track, four tennis courts, and a climbing wall. It is home to the Norwich tennis team.

This expansive, multipurpose building is used by all spring athletic teams for early season practices and as a venue for commencement, concerts, and other University functions. The Corps of Cadets and ROTC, conduct physical training in Shapiro.

During Fall Arrival, Shapiro Field House is a main location for Rooks and new students as they're in-processed for the start of classes. Rook families attend a welcome ceremony in Kreitzberg Arena before Rooks march to the upper parade ground to begin their first week of training.



Students, locals, and alums, enjoy attending athletic events including football games in the fall. During the winter months, Sabine Field (left) can be snow-plowed and lit to accommodate for the seasonal weather and shorter days.

Plumley Armory

This 4,000-person event space is used for many different special occasions and activities for our students and the local community.

You'll find our indoor swimming pool, wrestling room, weight room, basketball courts, running track, classrooms, and additional offices housed here. During the cold winter months, Plumley is especially useful for allowing our students to remain active year-round

The main floor is used for ceremonies, open houses, and balls, that take place on our campus. Downstairs is our Naval and Marine Corps ROTC Department and several classrooms.



Goodyear Pool is a six-lane, 25-yard pool, sloping from five feet deep at its shallow end to eleven feet at its deepest.



Plumley offers a large space for students to train and stay active no matter the season. We also host elegant evening events that include important dinners, commissioning, and performances.



Mack Hall

Mack Hall is the newest addition to our campus and debuted in 2019 to mark the University's bicentennial. This \$26 million academic building offers a mixture of state-of-the-art classrooms and faculty offices.

It is home to the Mack Auditorium, a performing arts center offering plays, presentations, lectures, debates, and movie nights. Mack Hall also features a cybersecurity "War Room" and an esports lab.

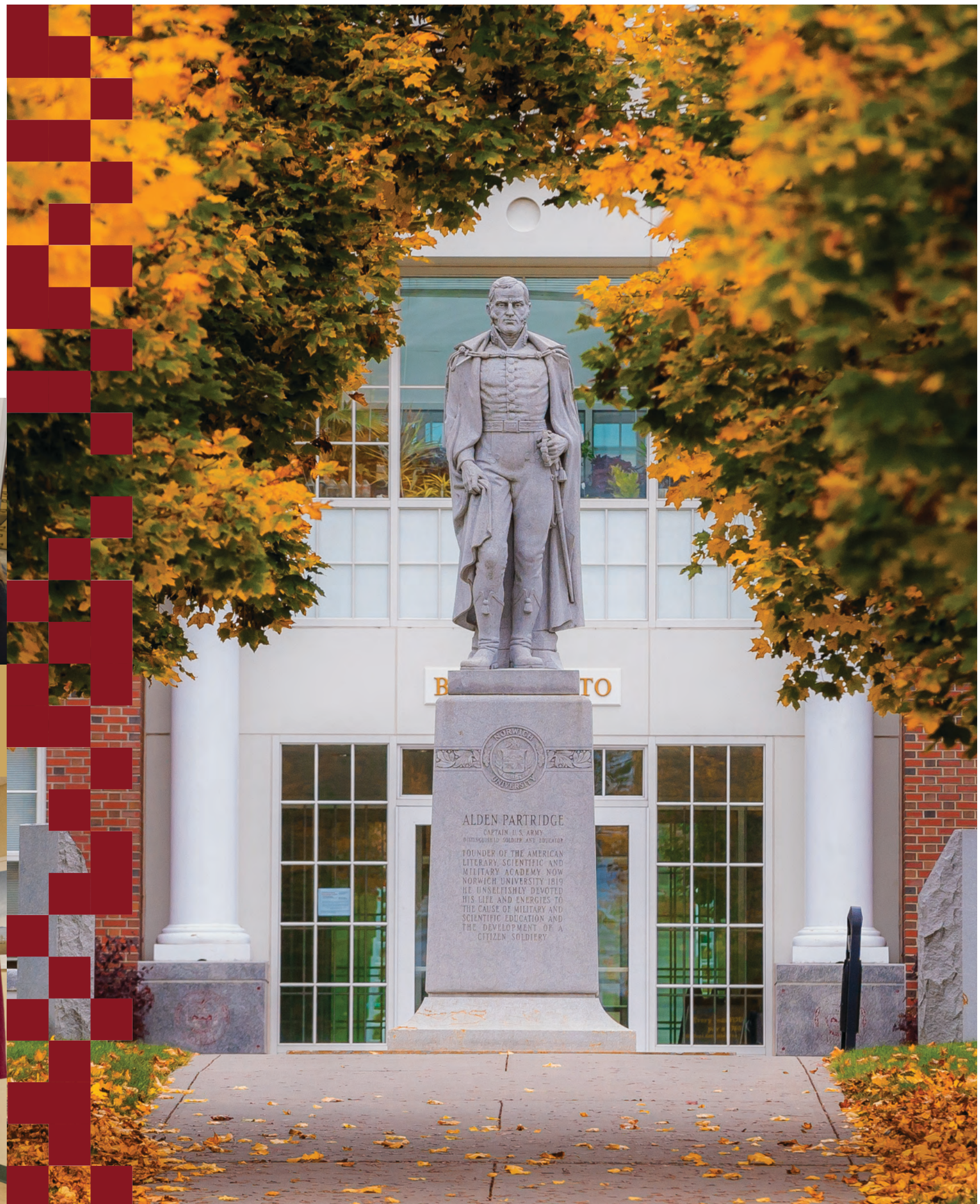
The U Building

The U Building is actually a nickname for this building on campus derived from its “U” shape. This building actually goes by many names depending on which wing you are referring to. For example, Bartoletto Hall, Juckett Hall, Partridge Hall, or Tompkins Hall.

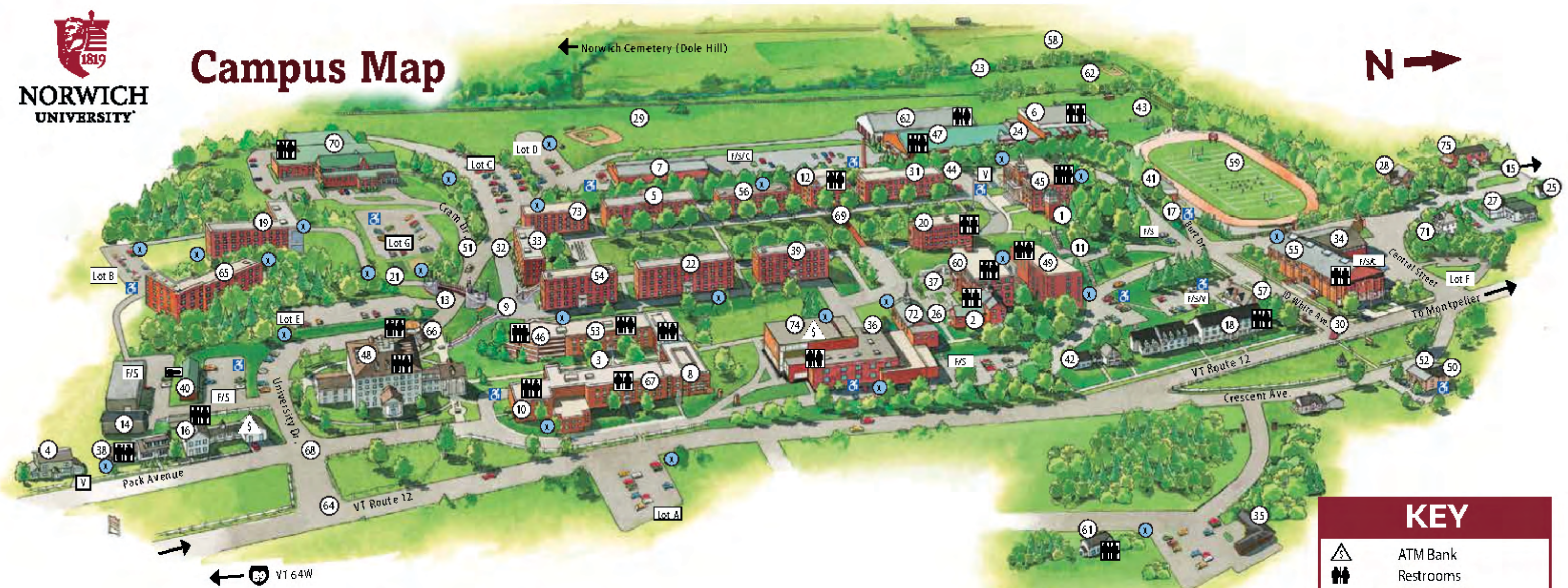
If you're not sure, just stick to simply calling it the U Building! It is home to our math and science departments, laboratories, engineering department, as well as our nursing classes and simulation labs.



The U Building is home to many different majors including math, chemistry (upper left), computer & electrical engineering (upper right), and nursing (below). Our nursing labs offer state-of-the-art facilities that mimic real hospital settings. No matter what your major, you will most likely take some classes in the U Building to fulfill academic requirements.
